Jayne's Passion to Keep the Peace

As a girl, Jayne Johnson was the one who broke up neighborhood fights. Since she was 13 years old, she wanted to be a police officer. In college she focused on it more, especially after a local murder. "The case really struck me," Jayne said, "If I can stop people like him from hurting people like them, that is really what I care about. Stepping in to do the job that a lot of people can't do. It's touchy and not pretty, but it can really make a difference. By making people's day better and safe, that's what drives me."

Now Employed in her Dream Job

She wasn't getting many job interviews, so she gave Vicki a call. "I wasn't sure what to do and wanted help from someone who knows the game. I also wanted to improve my interview skills," she said.

Jayne, while passionate about being a cop, faced a long time challenge in this competitive field. "Getting into this career—especially as a woman—is really difficult. I think I started trying out to be a police officer in 2004," she shared. "Vicki said something that really stuck with me. She said, 'I believe you have the answers and skills inside of you; we just have to find them." After four sessions of interviewing strategy and practice, Jayne nailed the interview and was offered a position to keep the peace in Lincoln City. As we push the send button, she is attending the police academy in Salem.

- 1. Let one passion direct your path and stay on it.
- 2. Find your biggest roadblock and seek support for it.
